

"UNDER WESTERN SKIES"

SYNOPSIS: "Under Western Skies" portrays the cycle of nature - not just the turn of one day, but, representing a period time.

- I. SUNRISE-Portrays nature's awakening. From the clouds and mists of dawn appear the birds, bunnies, lambs and shepherd. As the sun rises in the sky, nature becomes brighter and livlier. The tillers of the soil appear sowing the crops that will enventually bear fruit.
- ON THE TRAIL—A proud wild, stallion and his herd of wild mares are pasturing as tired work horses come down the trail—the first with wagon and driver; then a mare following the wagon. The weary horse stumbles over the rabbits, frightening both. A child in the wagon is nearly spilled out so the driver places him on the back of the mare. From the reaction of fright, the mare is caused to notice the handsome stallion then detaches herself, unnoticed, from the wagon in order to win over the stallion from the wild herd. Follows a flirtation between the stallion and mare which causes the jealousy of the wild young mares. From disillusionment and the stallions persistence to court the farm mare, they faint away and one stumbles over the sack of oats by the child. This arouses their appetites and the hungry horses attack the food, endangering the child. The Stallion moves to protect the child and replaces him on the mares back sending the mare on her way, away from danger. The Stallion remains sad the wild herd is victorious! sad - the wild herd is victorious!
- -At day's end, the Westerners return from their toil. The Air surrounds and caresses the Sun as she completes her daily round.
- CLOUDBURST—Country girl, teasing her boy friend, runs on the scene seeking a place to hide. Her friend pursues, and finds her. There is gaiety on the countryside as others appear and join in a dance. In the midst of the gaiety, the birds warn of a brewing storm. The country folk seek shelter as the Air is stirred in its movement; Clouds thicken; Wind, Lightning, Rain are fused on the scene as the downpour ensues. As the storm subsides, the Sun again makes its majestic entrance to reign over our "western skies". IV CLOUDBURST-
